










# Red Flowering Ironbark

Native to Eastern Australia, Red Flowering Ironbark has striking black bark with deep ridges and contrasting blue-grey leaves. Spectacular when planted in a row, in Winter to early-Spring this lovely evergreen native brings more colour to our streets as it bursts into clusters of pink to red flowers. The flowers are used in honey production and the tree also supports native birds. This hardy tree tolerates most conditions.
