










# Red Mahogany

Commonly referred to as the Red Mahogany due to its rough coppery coloured bark, this large native provides a pop of colour in a sea of green. Small creamy-white flowers that appear in the Summer months contrast well against the coppery bark. Suited best to open park spaces, the Red Mahogany serves as a food tree for Koalas as well as the Grey Headed Flying Fox. Nectar-feeding birds are also attracted to the flowers.
