

Rough-barked Apple

The Rough-barked Apple is a fine addition to both streetscapes and park settings as it provides colour, contrast and habitat options for native animals including flying foxes. The clusters of cream, white flowers bloom during summer and are pollinated by bees whilst the seeds are enjoyed by parrots.

The Rough-barked Apple can also regenerate from dormant buds after bushfires and can sometimes produce hollow logs with age that are used as habitat by native fauna.
